Simon Blakey is a Senior Visiting Fellow at the European University Institute School of Transnational Governance in Florence, Italy. He is a leading authority on the European energy industry and its global dependencies, in particular the Europe-Russia natural gas relationship and its changing character from the 1980s to today. With three decades of experience at the intersection of geopolitics, energy economics, climate change, working on government policies and business strategies, Simon has provided energy policy advice to governments and government agencies in Angola, Egypt, France, Germany, Israel, Mexico, the Netherlands, Nigeria, Norway, Russia, South Africa, Sweden, Turkey, and the United States.

Simon is a co-author, together with Daniel Yergin (Pulitzer Prize) and Professor Thane Gustafson (Georgetown University) of several landmark studies on the Russian-European commercial and political relationship, including the evolution of the Russian-Ukrainian gas crisis of 2009 and the European response.

During his consulting career, Simon has confidentially advised senior European decision makers in government and business about the risks and opportunities of the energy crisis triggered by Russia, with a particular emphasis on the importance of strategic planning to maintain solidarity and avoid conflicts of interest between EU member states. Simon has delivered more than 100 research and advisory assignments – including scenario studies – covering a broad range of strategic issues for energy companies worldwide on questions such as market entry strategies, merger and acquisition proposals, privatization advice, market analyses in support of FID for major pipeline projects, pricing strategy advice, and expert witness in arbitration cases. He is a regular speaker/chair at CERAweek (the energy sector Davos) and other high-level global energy and strategy gatherings.
